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Greece Facts to Know

The country of Greece is actually a peninsula – a large piece of land sticking out and almost surrounded by water. Greece is mostly a rocky, dry land with many hills and mountains.

Greece is located near the Mediterranean Sea or the Aegean Sea. The island of Crete was famous for sea trade.

The first Olympic Games were held in Greece over 2,500 years ago. Instead of medals, the winners were crowned with a wreath of wild olive leaves.

Many large communities in ancient Greece, such as Athens and Sparta, formed "city-states", where each area ruled itself. Athens is known as <u>The Birthplace of Democracy</u>, which is a very important concept to our country and the world today. Sparta developed a military-state.

Democracy means "ruled by the people" or "people power".

Boys in Sparta began to train to be warriors when they were only 7 years old. Even girls in Sparta were trained to be strong and tough.

Ancient Greece had many wars with the Persians. The battles of Marathon and Thermopylae became legends with stories of great heroes retold for thousands of years.

The word <u>marathon</u> honors an ancient Greek runner who courageously ran for 26 miles, without stopping, to deliver an important message to his commander, and then immediately died because of it.

In Athens, a beautiful temple called the Parthenon was built in honor of the goddess Athena. Many wonderful plays and debates were held there.

Many great thinkers lived and taught others in Athens. Three of the most famous are Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. Plato started a famous school called <u>The Academy</u>.

Ancient Greeks worshipped many gods and goddesses, who were said to live on Mt. Olympus. Some of them are:

- Zeus: the ruler of all gods
- Hera: wife of Zeus/goddess of marriage
- Apollo: god of light
- Artemis: goddess of hunting
- Poseidon: god of the sea
- Aphrodite: goddess of love
- Ares: god of war
- Athena: goddess of wisdom
- Hephaestus: god of fire
- Hades: god of the underworld
- Hermes: winged messenger of the gods
- Dionysus: god of wine

The famous Greek myths tell stories about these gods and try to explain about the mysteries of life and nature.

Alexander the Great conquered a huge empire for Greece and spread important Greek ideas and learning wherever he went.
